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# Oxford German Olympiad 2022, Round 2: Tasks and Guidelines

# Note that the closing date for submissions is 12 noon, Thursday, 10 March 2022

<u>Round 1</u> and Round 2 are separate competitions. You can enter both, but do not need to have completed Round 1 in order to enter Round 2.

Prize: The winner will be awarded a cash (bank transfer) prize (see individual tasks for amount) and invited to a prize-giving ceremony at the Bodleian Library, University of Oxford, in June 2022. The winning entries for the Sophie Scholl task will also be featured on the White Rose Project website.

- 1. Entries should be the work of the entrant alone. Any additional assistance given by teachers or others should be noted in the space provided in the submission form.
- 2. Entrants must be resident in the United Kingdom or Ireland.
- 3. Entrants must enter the competition individually. Entries from more than 1 person will not be considered.
- 4. Please note that we cannot accept postal or e-mail entries. Entries received after the deadline at 12 noon on Thursday 10 March 2022 will not be considered.
- 5. Files must be named in the following way:

**CompetitorSurnameCompetitorInitialOGO2022-Round2** (e.g. BloggsJOGO2021-Round2). Note that correct file naming is the responsibility of the entrant.

## THE TASKS

You can enter <u>only one</u> of the two tasks below. Please take note of the respective age restrictions.

### Celebrating 75 Years of British-German Town Twinnings (1947-2022)

A competition for schools sponsored by the British German Association and the Oxford-Bonn Link.

**Competition open to** pupils in years 9 - 12 (age 13-17) (age 16-18) **First Prize:** £100 **Second Prize:** £50 **Third Prize:** £25

This year we celebrate the 75th anniversary of the twinning between the City of Oxford and the City of Bonn. It was one of the four first twinnings between British and German cities, forming a beacon of post-war city friendship in 1947. Many other UK-German twinnings followed.

### Task: Town Twinning Time Capsule / Zeitkapsel Städtepartnerschaft

"Draw, or provide photographs of, 10 things related to each city (20 in total) for two identical Town Twinning Time Capsules, one to be buried in the British town or city and one in the German town or city. Provide a brief summary of the Twinning, and for each item an explanation in English and German of what the drawing/photo represents and why the item has been put in the capsule." (300 – 500 words in total).

#### The White Rose Project: Resistance Leaflets

**Competition open to** pupils in years 12 and 13 or equivalent (age 16-18). **Prize: £100.** The winning entry will also be featured on the White Rose Project website.

The White Rose ('Die Weiße Rose') was a group of students and a professor in Munich that wrote and distributed leaflets calling on Germans to resist Hitler. 2022 marks the 80th anniversary of the first four White Rose pamphlets, written and printed over the course of two weeks in the summer of 1942.

Task: "The White Rose resistance circle wrote a series of leaflets calling on Germans to resist Nazism. Many of the leaflets include quotations, from plays, philosophy, and even a line from a song. Write a blog post in German (max. 350 words) about a quotation that inspires you. How might that quotation inspire others to make the world a better place?"

The competition will be judged by members of The White Rose Project. The judges' decision is final and no correspondence will be entered into.

#### **HEAT** agreement
