Please note that we cannot accept postal or email entries. Entries received by post, by email or after the deadline will not be considered. Please read the following guidelines <u>carefully</u> before entering the competition:

1. Entries should be the work of the entrant(s) alone. Any additional assistance given by teachers or others should be noted in the space provided in the Online Entry Form.

2. All text included in the entries should be in <u>German</u> except where stated in the task instructions.

3. Entrants may only enter as individuals. Group entries will not be considered except for the "Open Competition for Groups" category, which is open to groups of 2-4. Entries from groups of more than 4 will not be considered for the "Open Competition for Groups" category.

4. Entrants must be resident in the United Kingdom. All entrants must indicate how long they have been learning German and/or if they are native speakers of German.

5. Entrants may only take part in one task within their age group as INDIVIDUAL entrants.

6. Where 2 or more entrants are entering as a GROUP, one nominated entrant should fill in the entry form. In the relevant box, the nominated entrant should list the first name and surname of each other member of the group. The nominated entrant is responsible for informing his



fellow group members about any communications from the Oxford German Network, e.g. about results, invitation to the prizegiving, etc.

7. Unless specified otherwise, entries should be submitted in one of the following formats only:

- * Microsoft Word document
- * PDF
- * JPEG

Files <u>must</u> be named in the following way: CompetitorSurnameCompetitorInitialOGO2022 (e.g. BloggsJOGO2022).

Note that correct file naming is the responsibility of the entrant and failure to use this format may impede efforts to trace the file in the submission system if it should go missing. The Olympiad Coordinator is not obliged to contact entrants to trace missing or misnamed submissions and this may mean that such files cannot be passed to the judges.

Film entries should be uploaded to <u>www.youtube.com</u> and a copy of the link submitted via the online form. The link must be entered in the relevant box AND uploaded as a Word or PDF document (the document should only contain the link). Original work in the form of a website link should also be submitted via the online form in the relevant box AND uploaded as a Word or PDF document. Note that many schools have their own YouTube channel which you may be able to use. YouTube also allows you to set up a private channel so that the only people who can see your video are those to whom you have sent a link. Please ensure that the link is enabled for the Olympiad judging team to view it. Make sure you have discussed this with your parent(s)/guardian(s) and your teacher before you upload anything to the internet! You must also make sure that you do not upload any material that is subject to third-party copyright.

8. The judges will take account of academic level, creativity, linguistic accuracy, stylistic sophistication and – where appropriate – factual accuracy of the submission. The decision of the judges will be final and no correspondence will be entered into.

9. Every submission must include a completed **Olympiad Teacher Form** (see below or <u>https://www.ogn.ox.ac.uk/files/ogn-olympiad-teacher-form.pdf</u>). If no teacher form can be supplied, please send an email to olympiad@mod-langs.ox.ac.uk with the subject line 'Olympiad Teacher Form' providing an explanation.

10. Entrants under the age of 13 (i.e. ages 9-12) must provide a **Consent Form** (see below or <u>https://www.ogn.ox.ac.uk/files/parent_form.pdf</u>). It must be signed by parents/guardians of entrants under 13, and a copy uploaded alongside the entrant's competition entry. Typed digital signatures will not be accepted. Submissions by entrants under 13 without a Consent Form cannot be considered.



The Competition Tasks

Choose <u>one</u> of the tasks appropriate for your age group. All tasks to be completed in German, unless indicated otherwise.

1.	Create an illustrated menu for a German, Austrian or Swiss restaurant and include the names of		
	10 different dishes. (1 side of A4).		
2.	You are a famous Konditor (pastry chef) in Vienna. Design a showpiece cake for the Wiener		
	Opernball gala dinner and give your drawing or painting 15 labels. (1 side of A4).		
3.	Draw a landscape (e.g. forest, mountains, meadows) in a German, Austrian or Swiss location with		
	plants that grow there and that can be used for food. Name the landscape and the region it is in,		
	and give each plant a label. (1 side of A4).		
Ye	ears 7 to 9 (age 11-14)		
1.	Write about a day in your life as an apprentice chef in a busy Berlin hotel kitchen. (100-200 words,		
	1 side of A4).		
2.	Create a short video instructing viewers how to cook a German, Austrian or Swiss dish of your		
	choice. (max. 4 minutes).		
3.	Listen to the Austrian poet Ernst Jandl reading his poem "Auf dem Land",		
	https://www.lyrikline.org/de/gedichte/auf-dem-land-1237, and work out what animals and		
	insects feature in it. Draw and label them, add a traditional Austrian recipe that relies on one of		
	the animals/insects, and also include a vegetarian or vegan alternative recipe. (1-2 sides of A4).		
Years 10 and 11 (age 14-16)			
1.	"Write a story about two children from different cultural backgrounds becoming friends through		
	food. (200-250 words).		
2.	Create an online exhibition about various kinds of bread in German-speaking countries, including		
	captions with information about the name, ingredients and how it is made. (must include 200-250		
	words).		
3.	"Was essen wir im Jahr 2100?" Give a video presentation on the topic. (max. 4 minutes).		
Years 12 and 13 (age 16-18)			
1.	Create a brochure or website for a food project linking different communities within a German-		
	speaking country. (300-400 words).		
2.	"Wie sichern wir eine nachhaltige Zukunft für unsere Nahrung?" Plan a conference on food		
	sustainability for 16-18 year olds including the advertisement and programme with keynote		
	lectures and topics for roundtable discussion sessions . (300-400 words).		
3.	Research the food culture of a society anywhere in the world in a period before 1800 and write		
	EITHER an essay about it OR a story about that period in which food plays a part. (300-400 words).		
0p	pen Competition for Groups (2-4 participants)		
1.	Create a humorous video sketch featuring food. (max. 4 minutes).		
2.	Develop an action plan for a crisis such as a natural disaster or war in which there is a sudden food		
	shortage. Define the nature of the crisis in the headline and present the action plan in an		
	impactful social media post for the local population. (4-6 sides of A4).		
3.	Organise a German bake-off in your school and create a video or website of the competition		
	highlights. (website must include 200-250 words, video max. 4 minutes).		
Discover German - Taster Competition (individual participants with no prior			
experience of studying German):			
1.	Years 5 and 6 (ages 9-11): You're about to open a restaurant in a German, Austrian or Swiss city.		
	Draw 15 items you will need (e.g. table, glass, knife, pepper mill) and label them in German. (1		
	side of A4).		
2.	Years 7 to 9 (ages 11-14): Find a traditional recipe for <i>Rouladen</i> , <i>Käsekuchen</i> or <i>Schwarzwälder</i>		
	Virishtarta Chaosa and aftham and maduca a list of 7 12 ingredients. Then grade a list of		

Kirschtorte. Choose one of them and produce a list of 7–12 ingredients. Then create a list of



alternative ingredients that would make the dish suitable for a vegan, and present your two lists attractively with a drawing or painting of the dish. (1-2 sides of A4).

- 3. Years 10 and 11 (ages 14-16): Create a crossword puzzle or game that includes the names of 15 vegetables and/or fruits. (max. 2 sides of A4).
- 4. Years 12 and 13 (ages 16-18): German loves building words from other words! Research and list words that are related to the verbs kochen and backen in terms of word formation, in the way that e.g. *essbar* (edible) or *Essenszeit* (eating time) are related to the verb *essen*. Give one translation for each word you find (the translation may consist of more than one word. (max. 2 sides of A4).
