Dear Germanist and language colleague,

This bumper edition of our newsletter brings you news of two recent language reports, two competitions, and gives you details of how to get involved in shaping language policy in the UK.

1. Language Trends survey 2015

The British Council's and CfBT annual Language Trends survey was published just before Easter. Key findings centre on the effect of the introduction of compulsory language teaching in KS 2, the concern about variation in the quality of KS 2 provision, the growing trend to exclude pupils from language study, factors threatening language A'levels, the unfair representation of schools with high language uptake as underperforming, and the dominance of French in KS 2 (as opposed to declining numbers at secondary level).

2. Living Languages 2015

If this hasn't quite satisfied your appetite for language reports, fret not, there is more! The Guardian and the British Academy have published the Living Languages report. Its seven key findings are:

- a) lack of language skills is bad for the economy
- b) young people are put off learning
- c) languages are about more than boosting your CV
- d) minority languages have a complex relationship with communities
- e) 6000 languages face extinction
- f) technology is a good match for languages
- g) learning languages is an enriching experience. (Who'd have thought?)

3. German Teacher of the Year Award – deadline 12 May 2015

The Embassy of the Federal Republic of Germany is pleased to invite nominations for the annual German Teacher Award, now in its 12th successful year. The winners will receive a personal prize and a certificate. The prizes will be presented at a

special ceremony at the "Sommerfest der Deutschen Sprache" in Cardiff on 3 July 2015, when the winners will be announced.

The purpose of the Award is:

- to recognise outstanding achievement by individual teachers of German in the UK

- to highlight and pay tribute to the work of German language teachers in primary and secondary schools in the UK

- to encourage the commitment of the winners' schools to modern language teaching.

Selection criteria:

Teachers will be selected who have made an outstanding and dedicated contribution to German teaching within the curriculum and beyond, e.g. through

- a record of successful teaching at a school, including innovative language teaching

- successful introduction of German teaching at a school, e.g. in a primary school as

a first foreign language or in a secondary school as a new language

- established and successful link activities with Germany, e.g. projects and exchanges, bilingual projects, curriculum projects

- use of German language in subjects other than German

- local or regional outreach activities

4. Stephen Spender Prize 2015 for poetry in translation – deadline 22 May 2015
